Q1 From the following list of choices, which issue do you think should be the Michigan legislature’s highest priority: solving the teacher shortage, providing incentives to bring good jobs to Michigan, providing targeted tax relief for those that need it most, getting rid of so-called “zombie” laws – meaning laws that are still on the books but not enforced such as the law against two people of the opposite sex living together, increasing consumer protection efforts such as addressing out of control fees, improving and modernizing our infrastructure, working to combat climate change, or something else?

Q5 Freedom of Information Act Requests involve individuals or groups requesting information from the government that is legally required to be available to the public. Do you think it is very important, somewhat important, or not important at all that the Governor and the state legislature be subject to the same Freedom of Information Act laws as local governments and state departments?

Q8 Big box retailers are currently using a tax loophole called the "dark store theory," where their property taxes are assessed as if the store is a vacant "dark store" even if the store is fully operational, resulting in much lower property taxes for these stores. The dark store theory has saved retail giants hundreds of millions of dollars in property taxes over the past decade and cost local governments the same amount in tax revenue. Do you support or oppose the Michigan legislature taking action to close this dark store tax loophole?

Q9 Do you support or oppose requiring corporations who cause contamination to pay to clean up their pollution rather than taxpayers footing the bill?

Q10 Polluter-pay laws ensure corporations who cause contamination or benefit from polluted property are required to pay to clean it up, rather than have taxpayers foot the bill. Michigan regulators estimate there are roughly 24,000 known contamination sites and taxpayers are footing the bill for managing or remediating half of them. Michigan had strict polluter pay laws until the early 1990s, when they were rolled back under Republican Governor John Engler's administration. Do you support or oppose reinstating polluter-pay laws that would ensure corporations that cause contamination are required to pay to clean it up?

Q11 Michigan lawmakers have introduced legislation that would establish a statewide septic code, requiring inspections of residential septic wastewater systems every five years. Michigan is the only state that does not have uniform standards governing the design, construction, installation, and maintenance of septic systems. The underlying goal of the legislation is to reduce the amount of contamination from failing septic systems from flowing into our lakes, rivers and streams. Do you support or oppose lawmakers passing legislation establishing a statewide septic code?

Q12 Do you think industrialized cattle, swine, and poultry operations should meet environmental standards regarding air and water pollution before being approved for federal loans, or not?

Q14 Michigan has the lowest landfill dumping charges in the region—charging only 36 cents per ton of waste disposed of in landfills. The average fee in the Midwest is \$5.30 per ton. Low landfill prices have made Michigan a prime dumping ground for other states and Canada. Over 17 million tons of waste are disposed of annually in the state. Having heard this, would you support or oppose raising the fee to dump waste in Michigan landfills?
