Q1 Recently, Governor Whitmer touted policy victories including expanding the Earned Income Tax Credit, repealing the state's 1931 abortion ban, repealing Right to Work, signing gun violence prevention measures, and expanding Michigan's civil rights act to include LGBTQ+ Michiganders. On the whole, do you strongly support, somewhat support, somewhat oppose, or strongly oppose these accomplishments?

Q4 The deal that the Biden Administration and Congress reached involves pausing the debt limit until 2025 so the US can pay its bills until then, when this vote will have to be held again. Q7 Right now, presidential candidates who win the most votes nationwide aren't guaranteed to win the election because presidents are elected using the Electoral College. Sometimes the candidate who wins the most votes nationwide does not win the most Electoral College votes and therefore loses the presidential election.
