Q1 Do you have a favorable or unfavorable view of the United States Supreme Court?

Q3 Michigan lawmakers recently voted to approve a state budget for 2024 that includes increased support for infrastructure, including drinking water; and public schools with items such as universal pre-K, free breakfast and lunch for every student; and broadband access for all. Q4 Michigan has long been ranked as one of the worst states when it comes to government transparency and accountability. Here's the first one: expanding Michigan's Freedom of Information Act so the governor's office and the legislature are subject to the same transparency rules as local governments and state agencies. Do you strongly support, somewhat support, somewhat oppose or strongly oppose this?

Q5 Here's the next one: closing the revolving door between state government and lobbying by requiring lawmakers to wait at least two years after leaving office before they can become lobbyists.

Q7 Multiple bills have been introduced in the state legislature to improve police practices and accountability. I am going to give you details of some of these bills and ask whether you strongly support, somewhat support, somewhat oppose, or strongly oppose them. Here's the first one: banning what is called a "no-knock warrant." No-knock warrants or raids involve police breaking into a building or home by force to execute a search warrant without announcing their presence. Banning no-knock warrants would mean police are always required to announce their presence before entering a building by force if necessary, except in extreme circumstances.

Q8 Here's the next one: requiring law enforcement officers to intervene if they see another law enforcement officer using excessive force or engaging in wrongdoing.

Q9 Here's the next one: requiring all police agencies to adopt new use of force policies including banning chokeholds except in extreme circumstances, requiring police officers to only use as much force as reasonably necessary to prevent imminent danger or an ongoing crime, and requiring officers to give a verbal warning before using force.

Q10 Here's the next one: specifying that police officers should not engage in a foot pursuit for minor, nonviolent offenses that pose no imminent danger or solely due to an individual's response to law enforcement.

Q12 Michigan has a handful of laws on the books that prevent local governments from enacting certain local laws. These are often referred to as "preemption" bills. Michigan currently prevents local governments from passing laws around areas such as wages, benefits, and even the use of plastic bags. There are bills currently moving through the legislature to remove these preemption laws.
